Veterans Honored

On Monday, November 12, Badger School District and community members gathered to honor the men and women who have served or are currently serving this great country. Guests were greeted by American Legion Auxiliary members Marian Dybedahl and Sharon Vacura, who pinned red poppies on the guests. The red poppy is a nationally recognized symbol of sacrifice worn by Americans since World War I to honor those who served and died for our country in all wars. It reminds Americans of the sacrifices made by our veterans while protecting our freedoms.

Badger School's Student Council members organized the program with the assistance of Mr. Johnson, Mrs. Dahlgren, Ms. Erickson, Mr. Carpenter, and Badger High School Concert Band and Choir. Badger Student Council President Alex Ylitalo welcomed those in attendance. Proceeding the welcome, the Posting of the Colors was performed by Roseau County Area Veterans David Vacura, Bob Glen, Morris Vacura, and Wayne Praska. Badger junior, Kennedy Truscinski, accompanied the Posting of the Colors by singing *The Star Spangled Banner*. The Badger High School Concert Band then followed with their performance "American Heroes."

Veteran's Day essay winners then shared their speeches with the audience. Junior high winners Riley Gust (3rd), Jordan Lee (2nd), and Jordan Davy (1st) read their essays on the topic "Why I Honor the American Flag." Badger High School Concert Choir performed "Johnny, I Hardly Knew Ye," followed by the Senior High essay winners—Bailey Maurstad (3rd), Emma Gust (2nd), and Greta Lee (1st)—reading their speeches "Why My Vote Matters." All students in grades 7-12 write essays that are forwarded to the veterans group without student names on the papers. Once the veterans choose the winners, Mrs. Dahlgren helps the winners prepare their essays for reading at the Veterans Day program.

Keynote speaker was Retired Air Force Veteran Dale Hagen. He talked about how the military has evolved throughout the respected branches. He talked extensively about (P38) that any Veteran would recognize. He explained how little things make a big difference in the life of the military. The P38, a universal military tool, was as important as your weapon or your boots... because it was a can opener the size of a quarter and if you didn't have it with you at all times, you didn't eat.

Dale Hagen and Mayor Jim Rinde presented the Dave Frislie Eagle Award to Bob Glenn and John Walsh to honor them as veterans who have given back to the Badger School, community, and fellow veterans. Ending the program, Jack Burkel played "Taps," followed by the Retiring of the Colors. Thank you to everyone in attendance.

Badger School District Awarded \$13,000.00 from JC Penney and NASA for FIRST Robotics Program

Badger School District is excited to announce the Badger FIRST Robotics team has once again been selected as a recipient of a \$5,000 Medtronic sponsorship. FIRST stands for For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology. The grant dollars will be utilized to cover registration fee for the regional competition as well as the initial *Kit of Parts*. The FIRST Robotics Competition challenges teams of young people and their mentors to solve an engineering challenge in a six-week time frame using a standard kit of parts and a common set of rules. The Badger FIRST Robotics team will build a robot which conforms to a set of rules and specifications. This year the FIRST Robotics theme is *Destination: Deep Space*. The Badger FIRST Robotics advisor is Mrs. Val Truscinski and the team consists of students from grades 9-12. Congratulations to the Badger FIRST Robotics team for being selected by Medtronic to receive this \$5,000 grant! The FIRST Robotics season will officially begin January 5.

Badger VEX Robotics Team Wins Tournament Qualifies for State Championship as well as National Competition

Vex Robotics is a program that explores the concept of STEM education. STEM is the acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math. Ramp-Up Topics for December

GRADE 6: Students will be introduced to the Cornell Note model of note-taking. Advisors will model the process for students and show a brief video on how the model works. Parents can ask their student to demonstrate and explain how the Cornell model works at home as well. Sixth grade students will also be learning about the four different types of colleges that will be available to them in the future.

GRADE 7: What does it take to have a high skill career and what are some benefits of having one? Students will learn that all studies show that on average, adults with postsecondary degrees earn substantially more than high school graduates. Students will look at the financial impact a postsecondary degree can have on earning potential. People who have high skill careers are more often happy, self-confident, healthy, and more frequently involved with efforts to better our society. Starting early to think about finding a career that not only pays well but also has personal and social benefits is what our December topics are all about.

GRADE 8: Eighth grade students will focus on being prepared for high school and the importance of making proper class selections during their high school careers. Students will review the state and local requirements needed for high school graduation, as well as college entrance requirements.

GRADE 9: Ninth graders will identify what they view as their own strengths and how they can use these to overcome obstacles they will surely face now and in their futures. In addition, they will be asked to assess their current study strategies, proven effective study strategies, and how study groups might benefit them.

GRADE 10: Is intelligence fixed? Won't a C student always be a C student? Sophomores will look at a theory that shows the difference between having a fixed mindset vs. a growth mindset. People can and do grow their ability to learn and achieve. Smart is not how we are born, smart is what we work to become. GRADE 11: Juniors will discuss the importance of choosing challenging courses to help them avoid the dreaded "senior slump." Student will view traditional course offerings for seniors to help them start thinking about spring registration. If they qualify, some students will be able to enroll or continue enrollment in college courses.

GRADE 12: Seniors will be exploring the concept of "good debt" versus "bad debt" and how it can impact their lives now and after high school. One activity specifically addresses credit card debt with high interest rates that can cause students to have financial difficulty when they graduate. Basic budgeting information will also be addressed.



National Honor Society (NHS) is a nationwide organization that recognizes high school students in grades 11 and 12 that go above and beyond academics. NHS helps and continues to help their communities by upholding the four pillars that National Honor Society was founded upon: scholarship, leadership, service, and character.

To be eligible to apply, a student must have a cumulative GPA of 3.22, as well as two letters of recommendation: one by a Badger faculty member, school administrator, or board members; and one from a community representative attesting to the student's character, leadership, and service to their school and community. Students also must agree to be present at the induction ceremony. Once students have been inducted and are officially a member, they must have ten volunteer hours of community service per year and maintain a 3.22 GPA. Christmas Brownie Trees

Ingredients

Brownies:

1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, melted and cooled, plus more for greasing the pans

1½ cups granulated sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

3 large eggs

1 cup all-purpose flour

½ cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1 teaspoon fine salt

½ teaspoon baking powder

3/4 cup semisweet chocolate chips

Sixteen 1½-inch pieces candy cane

White and gold sanding sugar and small non-peril candy-covered chocolates, such as Sno-Caps, for decorating

American Buttercream Frosting:

1 cup confectioners' sugar

½ stick (4 tablespoons) unsalted butter, at room temperature

Pinch of fine salt

½ teaspoon vanilla extract


1/4 to 1/2 tablespoon whole milk

24 drops green food coloring

1 drop red food coloring

Directions

Special equipment: A piping bag or resealable plastic bag



- 2. Stir together the butter, granulated sugar, vanilla, and eggs in a medium bowl. In another bowl, whisk together the flour, cocoa powder, salt, and baking powder. Add the dry ingredients to the wet ingredients and stir until just combined. Stir in the chocolate chips and divide the batter between the prepared pans, smoothing the tops. Bake until the brownies begin to gain a crust around the edges, pull away from the edge, and a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean, 35 to 40 minutes.
- 3. Let the brownies cool fully in the pans on cooling racks, about 1 hour. Cut each circle into 8 equal triangles with a knife. Use a small offset spatula or pie server to lift each triangle out of the pan.
- 4. For the American buttercream frosting: Combine the confectioners' sugar, butter, and salt in the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle attachment (or in a large bowl if using a handheld electric mixer). Mix on low speed until mostly incorporated. Add the vanilla, increase the speed to medium-high and mix until smooth. Loosen the consistency with milk as desired. Add 24 drops green food coloring and 1 drop red food coloring and mix on medium speed for 1 minute. Set aside.

 5. To assemble: Using the tip of a paring knife or a skewer, poke a small hole along the bottom edge of each brownie. Insert a
- candy cane "trunk" into each hole.
- 6. Fill the piping bag with the frosting and cut 1/4 inch off the tip. Using a zig-zag motion, pipe the frosting from the base to the tip of each tree. Decorate the trees with the sanding sugars and candy-covered chocolate, as desired.

The Bader High School sophomores were among 1,600 students who attended the 7th annual Northern Valley Career Expo Wednesday, October 31, at the Alerus Center in Grand Forks. The Expo introduced students to career opportunities available with Northern Red River Valley employers as they are beginning to plan for their future. In addition to attending two career seminars they selected from among 22 choices, students participated in the showcase floor where there were more than 150 hands-on exhibit booths designed to engage students and pique their interest about career opportunities in Northwest Minnesota and Northeast North Dakota. Sectors represented through business and industry exhibits included human services, communications, business, health sciences, manufacturing, engineering, agriculture, and technology. A construction zone and drone zone featured opportunities in those industries. Post-secondary schools with related programs also were in attendance, linking education to careers. The annual event is organized by a regional committee representing education, economic development, and workforce organizations in northwest Minnesota and northeast North Dakota. - ~ It was fun and you could find your profession.
























American Education Week Celebrated


