On Monday, November 11, Badger School District and community members gathered to honor the men and women who have served or are currently serving this great country. Guests were greeted by American Legion Auxiliary members Marian Dybedahl and Sharon Vacura, who pinned red poppies on the guests, a nationally recognized symbol of sacrifice worn by Americans since World War I to honor those who served and died for our country in all wars. These poppies remind Americans of the sacrifices made by our veterans while protecting our freedoms.

Badger School's Student Council members organized the program. Student Council President Deanna Rybakowski welcomed those in attendance. Proceeding the welcome, the Posting of the Colors was performed by Roseau County Area Veterans David Vacura, Morris Vacura, Wayne Praska, James Berger, Bob Glen and current service personnel Austin Maurstad and Morgan Praska. Badger's Bel Canto Choir accompanied the Posting of the Colors by singing *The Star Spangled Banner*. The Badger High School Concert Band then followed with their performance *The Stars and Stripes Forever*.

Veteran's Day essay winners shared their speeches entitled "What Makes America Great" with the audience. Junior high winners included: Paige Rybakowski (3rd), Aidan Carpenter (2nd), and Jordan Davy (1st). Senior high winners included: Emma Gust (3rd), Hallie Hietala (2nd), and Erika Howell (1st). Badger High School Concert Choir performed *American Anthem* between the junior and senior high speeches.

Guest speaker retired Navy/Air Force Veteran Dale Hagen had two surprise guests (even to him) – his son Eric J. Hagen (Air Force/Army) and family friend David (Jake) Jacobson (Retired Air Force). Dale introduced the two and spoke about their military history. Between the two servicemen, they served eighteen tours/deployments/TDY! Dale talked about having a child in the military and how he worried about his son every day until his return after each tour/deployment/TDY. The presentation allowed those in attendance to understand more about what our military families experience.

Dale Hagen and Mayor Jim Rinde helped in the presentation of the Dave Frislie Eagle Awards. Dale presented one to James (Ducer) Berger (Marine Corps) and veteran Morris Vacura presented one to his brother David Vacura (Army). These awards honor our local veterans who have given back to the Badger School, community, and fellow veterans. Dale also presented Austin Maurstad, who is currently serving in the Air Force Reserve, with his President Kennedy coin. Dale carried the coin throughout his entire military career, and he felt it was time to take it out of retirement and present it to someone currently serving our country. Ending the program, Jack Burkel and Kennedy Truscinski played *Taps*, followed by the Retiring of the Colors. Thank you to everyone in attendance.



Fresh Pumpkin Pie

Ingredients:

- 1 medium sugar pumpkin
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 recipe pastry for a 9 inch single crust pie
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground ginger
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 cup honey, warmed slightly
- ¹/₂ cup milk
- 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream

Directions:

- 1. Cut pumpkin in half and remove seeds. Lightly oil the cut surface. Place cut side down on a jelly roll pan lined with foil and lightly oil. Bake at 325 degrees until the flesh is tender when poked with a fork. Cool until just warm. Scrape the pumpkin flesh from the peel. Either mash or puree in small batches in a blender.
- 2. In large bowl, blend together 2 cups pumpkin puree, spices, and salt. Beat in eggs, honey, milk, and cream. Pour filling into pie shell.
- 3. Bake at 400 degrees for 50 to 55 minutes or until a knife inserted 1 inch from edge of pie comes out clean. Cool on wire rack.



National Honor Society (NHS) is a nationwide organization that recognizes high school students in grades 11 and 12 that go above and beyond academics. The purpose of the National Honor Society is to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to enter service, to promote leadership, and to develop character in secondary highs school students.

To be eligible to become a member, a student must have a cumulative GPA of 3.22, as well as two letters of recommendation attesting to the student's character, leadership, and service to their school and community. Students also must be present at the induction ceremony. Once students have been inducted and are officially members, they must have ten volunteer hours of community service per year and maintain a 3.22 GPA.

This year, returning members Deanna Rybakowski, Morgan Praska, Emma Gust, and Tessa Blumer welcomed new members Jack Burkel, Erika Howell, Avdyl Jasiqi, Bailey Maurstad, Bella Monsrud, Kiah Olafson, Alyssa Rinde, Alexis Rud, Kennedy Truscinski, and Emma VonEnde with a traditional candle lighting ceremony on November 14. Emma Gust and Deanna Rybakowski were the musical guests with flute solos. Dinner was prepared by Jodi and Elizabeth Randall and was served by sophomore honor students.

Ramp-Up Topics for December Submitted by: Stacey, Warne, Dean of Students

GRADE 6: Students will be introduced to the Cornell Note model of note-taking. Advisors will model the process for students and show a brief video on how the model works. Parents can ask their student to demonstrate and explain how the Cornell model works at home as well. Sixth grade students will also be learning about the four different types of colleges that will be available to them in the future.

GRADE 7: What does it take to have a high-skill career and what are some benefits of having one? Students will learn that studies show that on average adults with postsecondary degrees earn substantially more than high school graduates. Students will look at the financial impact a postsecondary degree can have on earning potential. People who have high-skill careers are more often happy, self-confident, healthy, and more frequently involved with efforts to better our society. Seventh graders will also be studying the importance of positive peer interactions and the "soft skills" necessary to be successful in any career.

GRADE 8: Eighth grade students will focus on being prepared for high school and the importance of making proper class selections during their high school careers. Students will review the state and local requirements needed for high school graduation, as well as college entrance requirements.

GRADE 9: Ninth graders will be asked to assess their current study strategies, proven effective study strategies, and how study groups might benefit them in high school and beyond.

GRADE 10: Is intelligence fixed? Won't a C student always be a C student? Sophomores will look at a theory that shows the difference between having a fixed mindset versus a growth mindset. People can and do grow their ability to learn and achieve. Smart is not how we are born, smart is what we work to become. Parents can find more information about the growth mindset at: https:// www.mindsetworks.com/parents/default

GRADE 11: Juniors will be provided information about the elements of college applications, which included tests and essays. The ACT, SAT, placement tests, preparation options, and guidance on writing essays for college scholarships and applications will be covered.

GRADE 12: Seniors will be exploring the concept of "good debt" versus "bad debt" and how it can impact their lives now and after high school. One activity specifically addresses credit card debt with high interest rates that can cause students to have financial difficulty when they graduate. Basic budgeting information will also be addressed.
