Foreign Exchange Student from Thailand! Lydia (Mutita) Arsaipanit

Host family: David, Sarah, Esther, Ben, and Micah Nelson

How do school days at Badger compare to those in Thailand? In Thailand, students and teachers have a specific uniform. Each grade has an individual room so students sit in class and teachers come to teach us. There are a lot of people in each class. My Thai school has six grades from 7th to 12th, each grade has 16 rooms, and each room has 45-50 people so we have 800 people in just one grade!!! At lunch, in my Thai school's cafeteria, there are more than 30 booths of restaurants so I can decide what I'm going to eat. Special events like prom, homecoming, elective classes like Foods and Consumer Math, we don't have those in Thailand so I'm really excited!

What is one thing you miss most in your Thai school? The Mentor System in high school. The junior students are randomly assigned a 10th grader to mentor. When the 10th grader becomes a junior, they are assigned to be mentors. The senior, junior, and sophomore become like family because of helping each other during the years. The mentors also spend time traveling and/or exchanging gifts with each other.

What do you like most about staying with the Nelsons? They take good care of me. I get along with Mom and Dad. They're like my Thai family. I enjoy spending time doing new activities with Esther. Also we play a lot of good games.

The hardest thing for you to adjust to in Minnesota? The weather!!! Thailand doesn't have snow so I hadn't seen snow before. I saw my first snow at Thief River Falls. It was really amazing and I was freezing!

Biggest shock that you have experienced so far? The first time I used the restroom in America at the LAX airport in California, between and below the doors there are very large gaps, which is very awkward. Also after using the restroom in Thailand we use a bidet shower, but in America people only use toilet paper. When I take a shower in Thailand, I can adjust the temperature in degrees Celsius, but in America I have to guess how many degrees the faucet should be rotated so that the water isn't too hot. Last culture shock that I have experienced so far is sitting in the theater. Seats in Thailand have different prices depending on the seat height and the type of chair. So the first time I went to the cinema, I tried to find where my seat was by the ticket number for a long time.

What made you want to become a foreign exchange student? I wanted to come to a western country since I was young because I want to speak another language very well, travel, and gain new experiences. The main reason I wanted to come to North America was to meet Justin Bieber! Lol.

What is your favorite activity you've done so far since you've been here? I would say eating because of the many snacks and desserts in the U.S. They are much better than in Thailand. M&Ms have become one of my favorite snacks. Dairy Queen, it's so good and everything comes in very big sizes!

What is the hardest part of learning the English language? For me it's to remember the meaning of a word. A lot of words I'm sure I've seen before but I can't remember their meaning!

What do students in Thailand do after school and on the weekend? Studying and going to the mall. Many students, including me, study after school until 9-10 p.m. Some students study after school until even midnight or 2 a.m. On the weekends we tend to spend time watching movies or eating at the mall for 2-3 hours and continuing to study.

How was your trip to the United States? I missed the flight to Minnesota and ended up staying at the LAX airport in California for 24 hours! That was because my friends and I went to the wrong terminal. We went to Terminal 5, but the right one was Terminal 2. Each terminal is so far apart so when we arrived at the right terminal ten minutes later, the plane was going to depart and we had a problem with our tickets so we needed to book a new flight. Our new flight wasn't until the next morning, so we had to figure out where we could stay that night. We were too tired to think of anything so stayed in the terminal to find something to eat. Four hours later, a police officer who happened to be Chinese saw me and my friends and he paid for our lunch and talked to the airline who then provided us with dinner and breakfast coupons. We ended up sleeping on the floor of the airport terminal.

Badger High School Nominates Kennedy Truscinski for 'Triple A' Award

Badger High School recently announced it has nominated Kennedy Truscinski for the Academics, Arts, & Athletics (AAA) Award. Sponsored by the Minnesota State High School League (MSHSL), the AAA Award honors high school seniors who have excelled in the classroom, on the athletic field, and in fine arts. Students who are nominated must have a minimum GPA of 3.0, participate in MSHSL sponsored fine arts and athletic activities, and comply with the MSHSL's Student Code of Conduct.

AAA Award recipients are selected through a multi-level process that involves League member schools, the League's administrative regions, and a special committee of educators, business leaders, and members from the fine arts and athletic communities. Regional winners will be announced at the AAA Banquet in Mahnomon on February 5, 2020.

The top two AAA Award candidates from each region will be recognized at an on-court ceremony during the Minnesota Boys' State Basketball Tournament in March. League officials will announce two state award recipients – one girl and one boy from both Class A and Class AA schools – during the on-court ceremony. Each state award recipient will receive a four-year \$1,000 scholarship.

Kennedy Truscinski participates in the Badger High School choir and band as a section leader. She has earned several superior ratings and one best-of-site participant award at MSHSL solo and ensemble contests. A consistent A honor roll student, she is a member of the Badger Chapter of the National Honor Society and has taken multiple college courses during her high school career. Kennedy serves as a captain of the Badger FIRST Robotics team and helped lead them to a MSHSL State Tournament championship in 2019, as well as an appearance in the 2019 FIRST Robotics World Tournament. She is a current member of the Gator golf team, clay target team, serves as a football team manager, and is very active in FCCLA. She plans to attend college next fall at the University of Minnesota, Rochester to major in nursing. Kennedy is the daughter of Alan and Valerie Truscinski of Greenbush.

Badger School Superintendent/Principal Kevin Ricke shared, "Our Badger School is pleased to nominate Ms. Kennedy Truscinski for the Triple-A award. Kennedy thrives academically; plus, she brings a can-do attitude and strong work ethic to any activity that she pursues. Pretty Cake Pops

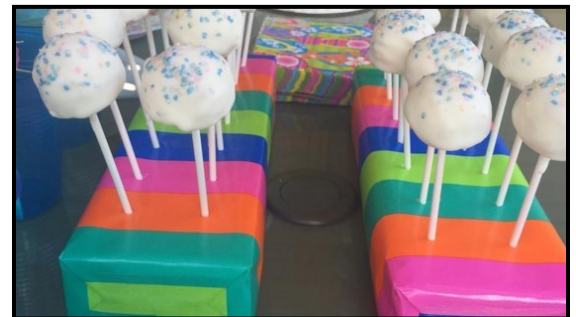

Ingredients:

- 1 (15.25 ounces) package yellow cake mix
- 1 cup water
- 3 eggs
- ½ cup vegetable oil
- 1 (16 ounce) container prepared vanilla frosting
- ¼ cup multicolored candy sprinkles, or as needed (optional)
- 1 (24 ounce) package vanilla almond bark, or as needed
- 1 package paper lollipop sticks
- 1 12"x12" block of styrofoam

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease bottom of 9x13-inch baking pan. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
2. Beat cake mix, water, eggs, and vegetable oil in a large bowl with an electric mixer on low speed until cake mix is moistened, 30 seconds. Increase speed to medium and beat until batter is thoroughly combined, 2 minutes. Pour into prepared baking pan.
3. Bake cake in the preheated oven until the top is lightly browned and a toothpick inserted into the middle of the cake comes out clean, about 30 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes before removing from pan to finish cooling.
4. Crumble cake into a large bowl and mix crumbs with vanilla frosting. Pinch off about 2 tablespoons of cake crumb mixture and roll into a ball about 1 inch in diameter. Repeat with remaining cake mixture. Place cake balls onto parchment paper-lined baking sheet and freeze for 15 minutes.
5. Pour candy sprinkles into bowl.
6. Melt 4 blocks of vanilla almond bark in a small saucepan over low heat and stir until coating is melted and smooth. Insert a lollipop stick into a cake ball and slowly and carefully dip the cake ball into the melted coating, spinning the cake ball slightly to get an even, smooth coat. Cover the entire ball and about ¼ inch of the lollipop stick where it meets the ball. Repeat dipping remaining cake balls, melting additional coating as you work.
7. Decorate each cake ball with candy sprinkles by dipping or applying as desired. Place lollipop handles into styrofoam block and let coating harden. Work quickly; coating will set in a minute or so.

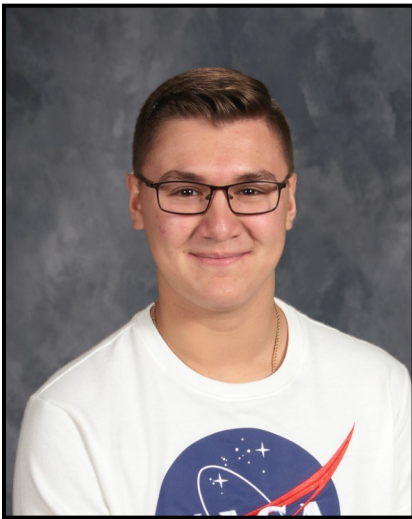

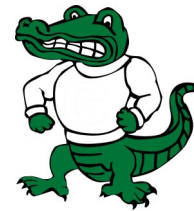

Ramp-Up Topics for January

GRADE 6: Part of students getting ready for postsecondary education is helping them to think about their dreams and aspirations, and to start thinking about how they can get there. Building this belief at this age is one of the most important aspects of college and career readiness. Students will also complete their Readiness Rubric.

GRADE 7: In this unit, the peer interactions that can sometimes get in the way of learning are addressed by sharing more positive ways to interact. Students will be reminded of many of the skills they learned in elementary school with our Responsive Classroom® approach. In addition, seventh graders will learn about the “soft skills” that are important in both school and the workplace, such as being on time, valuing diversity, having a strong work ethic, and good communication skills. Seventh graders will also explore the idea of Growth Mindset – basically, that our abilities and intelligence can change through our effort and learning. GRADE 8: During January, students will be asked to identify factors to consider when they are exploring the best postsecondary fit for them. The different types of colleges and majors are discussed. We don’t expect students to make a decision on a college, but we do want them to investigate the range of available options, and learn that the availability of majors they are interested in should be a primary factor when they do choose a postsecondary school down the road. Eighth graders will also explore potential careers and will have a panel of guest speakers to share their career experiences with the students.

Workshop: Career Panel

GRADE 9: Ninth grade students will explore the ever changing knowledge of a global economy and some careers that they might be interested within that economy. Students will prepare for a panel of guest speakers who will share their knowledge of education, training, and careers to help students better understand and prepare for their own future career.

GRADE 10: How will I pay for college? This unit will describe ways that students can and do pay for college. Students will look in depth at scholarships, grants, loans, and work-study. There is a good set of videos available to parents and students about paying for college at www.mnprivatecolleges.org/paying that can help answer many questions parents and students have about paying for college.

GRADE 11: Juniors will be studying the concept of “envisioning possible self” during the month of January. Research shows that students who have a positive vision for their future are more likely to invest in themselves now and do things that will benefit their future “possible self.” In addition, juniors will be looking toward finding the right postsecondary fit for themselves. In doing so, they will explore which colleges offer degrees, internships, and majors that are of interest to them. Students will discover there are a range of options available to suit their interests.

GRADE 12: Grading and preparing for class and tests are often quite different at the postsecondary level. Seniors will learn more about postsecondary expectations and how to prepare for them through the use of good study habits and study groups.
