Brooke VonEnde, a 2022 Badger School alumni, has always had a passion for agriculture. She lives in rural Badger where her family has raised long-horn cattle since 2013. Agriculture become a passion of hers after farming with her dad. She believes that farming can be a challenge as a woman because of many stereotypes, but she says that this has driven her to work harder to reach her goals.

In July Brooke was crowned the 2023 Roseau County Miss United States Agriculture. Then on December 3, Brooke competed in Faribault, Minnesota, and won the 2023 Minnesota Miss United States Agriculture title and also took home the 2023 Minnesota People's Choice Miss United States Agriculture title. As stated on the Miss Agriculture USA website, "The Miss United States Agriculture Program is to truly advocate for agriculture by using the crown and sash as an avenue to start conversations. The Miss United States Agriculture program was started in 2014 to encourage women in agriculture to teach and enhance the American Agriculture Story. Since the program's launch, agriculture advocacy has spread across the United States, covering all ages!"

As part of the program, Brooke is currently working to attend and create many agriculture-related events. For example, she is currently working on a Discover Dairy program with Badger's second grade class, which will help her get the outreach needed for the national pageant that will take place July 7-8 in Enterprise, Alabama. Brooke is attending Northland Community & Technical College for Farm Operations and Management. The title of *Minnesota Miss United States A griculture* will give her the opportunity to advocate for women in agriculture, as well as allowing her to advocate for the general benefits of local agriculture.

BUILDING READERS

How Families Can Help Children Become Better Readers

Boost school skills while having some reading and writing fun!

There are many entertaining reading and writing activities that help children strengthen valuable skills. Encourage your child to:

- Look at a globe or world map and pick a country. Have your child research and share five interesting facts about it.
- Look up events that happened on the day your child was born. Your child can write about them in a journal or use the news headlines to make a poster.
- Invent a new board game. Have your child design the board and game pieces, and write down the rules.
- Conduct a nature study. How many animals, birds and insects can your child find in your backyard or a local park? Encourage your child to take or draw pictures of them and research the critters online.



Ask four questions about online sources

When doing a research project, teach your child how to find reputable and reliable information online. To evaluate internet sources, help your child consider these four questions:

- 1. Is this source reputable? Help your child do some research on the website or social media outlet that has posted the information.
- 2. Is this source biased? Information that comes from a company might be designed to sell their product. Information from an organization might reflect a particular agenda.
- **3. Is the information accurate?** Do other reliable sites include the same information?
- **4. Is the information up-to-date?** Science studies, for example, may become outdated when newer research is completed.

Use coupons to turn shopping into a reading experience

Do you use coupons while grocery shopping? If so, let your child help you—and build reading skills at the same time.

Before going to the store, ask your child to write a shopping list based on the coupons you plan to use. At the store, have your child read the list to you, find the coupons you need, and match them to the correct products.

Read about spring cleaning

Will your family be doing some household cleaning chores this spring? Ask your child to read the safety labels on cleaning products before beginning and explain the label directions to you.

Reading safety labels is a practical example of how reading is essential in daily life.

Play the license plate letter game!

Use the license plates you see while on the go to inspire a letter-based game. Have your child call out the letters on a license plate. Take turns thinking of silly phrases that use words beginning with those letters.

For example, if the letters on the plate are YPZ, you might say, "young painted zebras" or "yellow potted zinnias." The person who thinks up the wackiest phrase wins!



BUILDING READERS®

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Reading aloud offers many benefits

Even though your child is beginning to read independently, it's essential to continue reading aloud together. Reading aloud not only gives you quality time with your child, it also introduces new ideas, concepts and vocabulary.

Each time you read aloud together, you are developing your child's:

- **Reading comprehension skills.** Talk about what you read. What is the main idea? What led up to the story's climax?
- **Vocabulary.** Look up new words together and try to use them in a sentence.
- Listening and speaking skills. After reading a passage, ask your child to summarize it.
- Analytic skills. Ask questions such as, "Why do you think this happened in the story? Why is this character your favorite? Why do you think the author chose this ending? What would you have done differently if you were the author?"

Share five steps to writing success

Understanding the writing process not only improves students' writing skills—it strengthens reading skills, too. Encourage your child to:

- 1. **Prewrite.** Brainstorm and bounce ideas off someone. Then take those ideas and create an outline.
- **2. Draft.** Write a first copy—without worrying about mistakes!
- **3. Revise.** Read through the paper at least once. Does everything make sense? Are there better ways to say things?
- **4. Edit.** Check grammar, punctuation and spelling.
- **5. Review.** Read the paper aloud to catch mistakes.





: How can I help my elementary schooler remember the difference between synonyms and antonyms?

Remind your child that *synonyms* have the same, or similar, meanings (such as *happy* and *cheerful*). Point out that the words *synonym*, *same* and *similar* all start with the letter s. *Antonyms*, on the other

hand, are words with opposite meanings (such as fast and slow).

Exposure to correct grammar improves language skills

Learning grammar rules can be tough—but reading a variety of books makes it easier. When children read well-written text, they see how language should be used—which makes it easier to recognize mistakes in other materials, including their own writing.

For lower elementary readers:

- *Mine-o-saur* by Sudipta Bardhan-Quallen. The Mine-o-saur refuses to share toys and snacks—and soon he realizes he has no friends to play with! How will the Mine-o-saur solve this problem?
- My Teacher is a Monster (No, I Am Not) by
 Peter Brown. Bobby
 thinks that his teacher
 is a monster. But when
 he sees her in the park,
 his views begin to change.

For upper elementary readers:

- Poem Runs: Baseball Poems and Paintings by Douglas Florian. Get ready for baseball season with this collection of poems about various positions and pieces of equipment.
- Yellowstone Moran: Painting the American West by Lita Judge. Tom Moran was a talented artist who became a great explorer in a land called the Yellowstone.


What position do you play? Guard

GRADE 6: Why is it important for students to aspire to go to college and how can they pay for it? These two big questions will drive the learning for Ramp-Up topics this month. This unit provides a way for students to begin to understand the average salaries adults earn based on their level of education, how much colleges cost, and how attaining a postsecondary credential or degree will be beneficial to them in the long run. GRADE 7: Students will be focusing on the knowledge and skills that build a belief that they really can attend college. Each student needs to develop a belief in his or her own abilities and how those abilities will positively impact their future. This unit encourages students to identify their individual strengths in terms of knowledge and skills needed for college so they can further create an understanding and belief in themselves as college-going students. Students will also get the chance to find out what college is really like be asking current college students. *Workshop: College Panel*

GRADE 8: Students will gain a better understanding of the costs of two-year and four-year colleges, and what the differences are between public and private colleges. Parents may be interested in visiting this link to learn more about comparing the costs of colleges: https://bigfuture.collegeboard.org/compare-colleges. The sticker price of college is not necessarily the price you will have to pay. Eighth graders will also be learning the ways they can pay for college including grants, scholarships, loans, savings, and work study.

GRADE 9: During March, students will be introduced to 21st Century skills. They will explore the area of career and technical education (CTE) programs and classes that are offered at Badger High School to help introduce them to a wider range of options for future employment that includes the trades, FACS, and business. Ninth graders will also be using a free online tool called Quizizz to help them review key concepts, terms, and ideas related to 21st Century skills. Students will also look at what options for earning college credit are available to them while they are still attending high school.

GRADE 10: What are some options for after high school? In March, sophomores will investigate the college admission process, assess themselves on where they stand with regard to the process at this point, and learn about the purpose of admission exams like the ACT and SAT. Options in the military will also be discussed. Students will learn about the differences between military officers and enlistees, and why credentials are an option for the latter.

GRADE 11: During March, juniors will be shown tools to help them begin to narrow their postsecondary options based on specific criteria like majors offered, type of degree program, school demographics, and more. Vocational, 2-year, and 4-year colleges are explored, as well as apprenticeships. One of the goals for this month is to make sure students are aware of the range of options available and even if they may not be interested in a particular option, learning about it can help them respect their classmates' choices. Juniors will also understand the influencing factors when choosing a school, the importance of campus visits, and the ideas of "safe," "match," and "stretch" colleges.

GRADE 12: Seniors will be reviewing the importance of setting and working hard to achieve their goals. Students will learn about the goal setting process, formulating their own goals, and of importance perseverance as it pertains to meeting long-term goals like earning a college degree and finding a rewarding career. Seniors will learn more about the college experience by talking to experts – current college students.
