November Ramp-Up Topics

GRADE 6: Using a planner is a very important way for students to stay organized and on top of their academic and extracurricular schedules. Students use their school planners to stay organized with classroom assignments and upcoming important events. Parents can support the importance of using a planner by checking their child's planner daily and discussing the importance of staying organized. Students will also learn where to go when they need help when they are in school – whether it is for academic or personal reasons. 6th graders will complete their Readiness Rubric after first quarter grades are posted.

GRADE 7: What are some of the newest careers? What is my strongest learning style and what careers does it pair well with? On average, Americans change jobs eleven times during their working careers. Students need to build a strong academic and skill base to keep up with the ever-changing world. The value of earning a postsecondary degree can help students prepare for the careers of the future. Students will also complete a Readiness Rubric check in after first quarter grades are posted.

GRADE 8: What does it take to be academically successful in college? Students will understand the types of academic behaviors they should develop by the time they leave high school to be successful in credit bearing courses in college. Eight graders will also focus on the importance of peer relationships, the types of peer influences they experience, and the influence society and the media has on those relationships. At the end of first quarter, students will spend some time updating their Readiness Rubric.

GRADE 9: In addition to updating their individual Readiness Rubrics, 9th grade students will concentrate on how and where students can find the help they need in high school. Help is something everyone needs and should never be shy about asking for it. Specific examples of where to go for help at the Badger School will be discussed.

GRADE 10: Motivation matters. Sophomores will focus on intrinsic and extrinsic motivation and compulsion (the things we are required to do). Is extrinsic motivation the best way to go? Students will have discussion regarding the benefits and drawbacks of getting paid for good grades. An update of each individual's Readiness Rubrics is also planned.

GRADE 11: During November, students are asked to think about their role in approaching learning in a more independent setting. Juniors will focus on the importance of Gathering, Analyzing, Synthesizing, and Presenting (GASP) information in an independent manner. The Readiness Rubric will also be updated and reviewed.

GRADE 12: Seniors will update their Readiness Rubric and will learn the difference between "good debt" and "bad debt." Of current college undergraduates, 91% have at least one credit card and the average college student has \$4100 in credit card debt. Examples of good debt can be a reasonable college loan that can lead to a high skilled career or purchasing a home that fits within one's budget.

The 1951 E4 Co-op was purchased new in 1952 by Gerhard Anderson of Malung, from Farmer's Union in Roseau who was the Cockshutt/Co-op dealer. Gerhard traded the tractor in to Roseau Farm Service in about 1968. It was then purchased by Leland Lee, father of Kraig Lee of Wannaska. After many years, it was sold to Lester Ostlund. In the summer of 2005, Cockshutt collector Curtis Haugen of Roseau bought it. In 2016, he donated it to the Badger shop class for a restoration project. 
Badger FCCLA Travels to Nationals


