

Badger Robotics Team 3750 Competes at Two Off-Season Events

Gator Robotics travelled to two off-season events in October. Off-season events utilize the previous season's robot and game to initiate new members into the world of robotics and help refresh old members. The first event was the Minnesota Robotics Invitational (MRI) which was held in Roseville, MN, at the Roseville Area High School on October 13. Due to other sports still in action, the team was only able to take nine team members and three mentors to this event. Gator Robotics completed their qualification round undefeated with a record of 7-0. For the alliance selection, the team chose KOATIC Robotics from Frazee and The Fighting Calculators from Duluth East to join them in the elimination rounds. Team 3750 would defeat the fourth alliance the first round of a best two out of three elimination with a score of 469-266. As luck would have it, they would lose their next two rounds 314-326 and 274-302, moving them into the third place round. This round is a one-and-done competition, where Gator Robotics took on the number three alliance. The team would go on to claim the victory and bring home a third place finish. On October 27, the team headed to Bemidji for the Northern Minnesota Robotics Conference (NMRC) Championship, which was held at the Bemidji High School. This is a conference competition recognized by the Minnesota State High School League



and is the only one in the state. This time, 27 team members and seven mentors would make the journey to compete. Gator Robotics encountered some bad luck in a couple of their qualification rounds: one match the robot tipped, leaving it immobile for the majority of the round, and in another match, the robot would not connect to the field management system so it could not participate in that round. The team completed the qualification matches with a record of 10-2 positioning them in third place overall. For alliance selection, they chose Patriotic Robotics from Pequot Lakes and The Regulators from Cass Lake/ Bena. Team 3750 took on the number two alliance in their semifinal matches (again best two out of three wins). The first match, The Regulators would complete the autonomous portion of the match and sit the remainder of the match. The alliance lost their first

match 164-370. In the second match of semi-final action, The Regulators would become stagnant part way through the match, and the alliance lost 183-363. Again the team moved to the third place round. At this point, as alliance captain, the team decided to select a different robot to replace The Regulators. The alliance selected UC-Botics out of Upsala to join them. This new alliance would go on to defeat the number four alliance with a hefty win to claim the third place finish.

Throughout the NMRC competition, judges visit each team's pit to talk with team members and judge them for various awards. At this event, Gator Robotics was awarded the Engineering Inspiration Award. This award is given to the team who celebrates outstanding success in advancing respect and appreciation for engineering within a team's school or organization and community. This is the first time in the history of Team 3750 that this award has been achieved.

The NMRC marked the final competition for J.D. (the 2018 robot named after James Dostal). This robot will now go into retirement, as Gator Robotics Team 3750 looks forward to the 2019 game "Destination Deep Space," which will be released on January 5, 2019. The team thanks all of their sponsors for the support they offered throughout the 2018 season. Without them all of this would not be possible!

Ramp-Up Topics for November Submitted by: Stacey Warne, Dean of Students

GRADE 6: Sixth grade students will learn how to recognize when they need help understanding something and where they should go to get that help. Students will be shown a power point that outlines the people available to help them here at school. Students will also be introduced to the Readiness Rubric during the month of November.

GRADE 7: What are some of the newest careers? What is my strongest learning style and what careers does it pair well with? On average, Americans change jobs eleven times during their working careers. Students need to build a strong academic and skill base to keep up with the ever-changing world. The value of earning a postsecondary degree can help students prepare for the careers of the future. Students will also complete a Readiness Rubric check-in after first quarter grades are posted.

GRADE 8: Eighth graders will focus on the importance of peer relationships, the types of peer influences they experience, the influence society and the media has on those relationships, and how they can begin to solve problems with peers now and in the future. At the end of first quarter, students will spend some time updating their Readiness Rubric.

GRADE 9: In addition to updating their individual Readiness Rubrics, 9th grade students will concentrate on how and where students can find the help they need in high school. Help is something everyone needs and should never be shy about asking for it. Specific examples of where to go for help at the Badger School will be discussed. Students will also review high school requirements for graduation as well as admissions requirements for two and four year colleges.

GRADE 10: Motivation matters! Sophomores will focus on intrinsic and extrinsic motivation and compulsion (the things we are required to do). Is extrinsic motivation the best way to go? Students will have discussions regarding the benefits and drawbacks of getting paid for good grades. An update of each individual's Readiness Rubrics is also planned.

GRADE 11: During November, students are asked to think about their role in approaching learning in a more independent setting. Juniors will focus on the importance of Gathering, Analyzing, Synthesizing, and Presenting (GASP) information in an independent manner. Students will also explore the different types of financial aid available and learn about the FAFSA4Caster. The Readiness Rubric will also be updated and reviewed.

GRADE 12: Seniors will update their Readiness Rubric and will also discuss the financial aid options available to help them pay for college. Some options include grants, scholarships, work study, and loans. Seniors will also look at strategies to avoid the dreaded "Senior Slump."

Riley Gust (8th grade): My favorite book is *Before I Fall*. It is my favorite book because it's a drama and romance. It is very detailed and thrilling as well!


Ashley Stainbrook (9th grade): My favorite book is *The Living*. It is my favorite book because it is filled with action and mystery.



Awesome Sausage, Apple, and Cranberry Stuffing

Ingredients:

1½ cups cubed whole wheat bread
3¼ cups cubed white bread
1 pound ground turkey sausage
1 cup chopped onion
¾ chopped celery
2½ teaspoons dried sage
1½ teaspoons dried rosemary
½ teaspoon dried thyme
1 Golden Delicious apple, cored and chopped
¾ cup dried cranberries
1/3 cup minced fresh parsley
1 cooked turkey liver, finely chopped
¾ cup turkey stock
4 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degree F. Spread the white and whole wheat bread cubes in a single layer on a large baking sheet. Bake for 5 to 7 minutes in the preheated oven, or until evenly toasted. Transfer toasted bread cubes to a large bowl.
- 2. In a large skillet, cook the sausage and onions over medium heat, stirring and breaking up the lumps until evenly browned. Add the celery, sage, rosemary, and thyme; cook, stirring, for 2 minutes to blend flavors.
- 3. Pour sausage mixture over bread in bowl. Mix in chopped apple, dried cranberries, parsley, and liver. Drizzle with turkey stock and melted butter, and mix lightly. Allow stuffing to cool completely before loosely stuffing a turkey.

Several Badger students attended industry tours at Polaris Industries in Roseau and Arctic Cat in Thief River Falls as part of Manufacturing week in October. They toured the assembly lines to see how different products are made. They also visited the smaller departments like welding, machining, and tube bending. 
Opportunities in FCCLA
