Chef John's Make-Ahead Turkey Gravy

Ingredients:

1 large onion, chopped

2 carrots, chopped

2 ribs celery, chopped

2 teaspoons vegetable oil

2 large turkey wings

2 tablespoons cold water

10 cups cold water

4 sprigs fresh thyme

2 cloves garlic

3 tablespoons butter

½ cup all-purpose flour

salt and ground black pepper to taste

1 pinch cayenne pepper



Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.
- 2. Combine onion, carrots, celery, and vegetable oil in a large roasting pan and toss to coat. Place turkey wings on top of vegetables
- 3. Place roasting pan in the preheated oven and cook until the turkey wings are browned and vegetables are caramelized and softened, 45 to 60 minutes.
- 4. Transfer turkey wings and vegetables to a large stockpot. Place the roasting pan over a stovetop burner on medium heat. Pour 2 tablespoons cold water into the pan and bring to a boil, scraping up any browned bits. Transfer mixture to the stockpot and add 10 cups cold water, thyme, and garlic.
- 5. Bring turkey wing mixture to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer, uncovered, until meat falls off the bone, about 3 hours. Skim off turkey fat throughout the process and set aside 2 tablespoons.
- 6. Strain turkey stock and reserve 6 cups of stock; discard all the solids.
- 7. Heat butter and 2 tablespoons reserved turkey fat in a large saucepan over medium heat. Sprinkle in flour and cook, whisking continuously, until it begins to smell like cooked pie crust, 2 to 3 minutes. Slowly pour in turkey stock, whisking continuously. Increase heat to high and simmer until thick and warmed through, about 5 minutes. Season with salt, black pepper, and cayenne pepper to taste.

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Campaign Launched to Halt Spread of Deadly COVID-19 Virus in Roseau County

Citizen campaign says "It's Up to Me" to keep citizens, schools and economy safe from the virus.

(October 29, 2020) An emergency campaign to protect Roseau County citizens from the dangers of the Coronavirus pandemic has been launched with the leadership of the county's Emergency Management office.

"Because infections are rising here and in surrounding areas, the time is now to take urgent action to control the COVID-19 virus," said Sue Grafstrom, the office's director.

Grafstrom, with participation from business and community leaders throughout the county, have created a campaign entitled "It's Up to Me" – Roseau County coming together to stop the spread of COVID-19.

A member of the campaign planning committee, Brenda Sather, Sr. Vice-President, Chief Risk Officer of Border Bank, said, "It's urgent that we call upon our citizens to take personal responsibility to contain the spread of this disease."

The campaign will engage people from throughout the community to send the important messages about safe behavior to their own networks. There will be appeals from students, parents, medical leaders, business leaders, religious leaders, outdoors enthusiasts, seniors and others. They'll be sending messages about "It's Up to Me" through social media, print media, broadcast media, newsletters, blogs and many more channels.

"Only this week, White House pandemic advisor Dr. Deborah Birx identified Minnesota – including Greater Minnesota – as a danger zone. This is true in Roseau County where numbers have doubled in a short period of time," Grafstrom said.

Another member of the planning group, Brenda Baumann, Director of Discovery & Development Hub said, "We must work together to keep our citizens safe, especially as we will all be spending more time indoors, where the spread of the virus is most dangerous."

"We need this information to ripple throughout our Roseau County communities," Ms. Baumann said.

Grafstrom said the crucial and life-saving information messages of the campaign are straightforward and have been consistently communicated by the CDC, Minnesota Department of Health and LifeCare Medical Center: *Please stay smart.* Protect yourself, your family and community. Wear that mask, distance yourself, avoid gatherings, and wash your hands repeatedly. Please keep your guard up. It's really not that difficult, and everyone can participate. "It's Up to Me."

Ms. Baumann said, "We want people to adopt an attitude that each person is responsible for keeping schools open, keeping businesses running and keeping vulnerable relatives safe. We want them to ask themselves, 'What can I do to save lives and keep our communities safe?"

Grafstrom said, "We know it's natural to want to want this pandemic to just go away. But if we ignore precautions, it won't go away. It will only get worse. So together, let's stop it by saying 'It's Up to Me."

Badger School's Ramp-Up to Readiness Program Enters Seventh Year

The Badger School is pleased to offer the Ramp-Up to Readiness program to our students again this year. As a reminder, Ramp-Up's curriculum focuses on preparing students for postsecondary education and life by targeting five specific areas (Readiness Pillars):

- 1. Academic Readiness: Students have the knowledge and skills to do first-year, college-level work.
- 2. Admissions Readiness: Students have completed requirements for admission for the postsecondary education that matches their goals, interests, and abilities.
- 3. Career Readiness: Students understand how education determines income and opportunity in the global economy, which types of jobs need skilled workers, will pay enough to support a family, and will be a good match for their interests and abilities.
- 4. *Financial Readiness*: Students will be able to cover the cost of one term of study at a postsecondary institution through savings, loans, work-study, and/or financial aid.
- 5. **Social & Emotional Readiness**: Students know how to set educational goals, make progress toward those goals, and build relationships with peers and adults that support the achievement of those goals.

Badger students in grades 6-12 meet weekly with their grade level advisors to complete activities that will help prepare them in the five areas above. In addition, students will create a Readiness Rubric that allows them to continually monitor their progress toward reaching their academic goals. Students also create a Postsecondary Plan to help them plan their academic and career life beyond high school. Students meet with their advisors in a workshop setting that could involve guest speakers, interest inventories, career surveys and exploration, filling out college applications, and more.

Here is a snapshot of the of the topics students studied in October and will be engaged with during November:

GRADE 6: Students will focus on the importance of college readiness and the main components of the Ramp-Up program, how to calculate GPA, and why it is important for them to do well in their classes. They will learn how to set SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Timely) goals and how to practice setting goals, as well as using the importance of a planner.

Workshop: Career Cluster Interest Survey

GRADE 7: Seventh grade students will learn how important having good habits like being organized, taking effective notes, showing up ready to learn each and every day, studying and setting goals will help them be more successful academically. Study groups and learning about their individual learning styles will also be addressed. Students will learn more about SMART goals, the importance of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making. Post-Secondary Plans and Readiness Rubrics will be updated.

GRADE 8: Students will review the habits they have that make them successful and how to set goals to help them be even more successful. Using a planner, taking Cornell Notes, and setting SMART goals are important to helping students succeed in school. Eighth graders will also investigate what motivates them intrinsically and extrinsically, as well as what academic knowledge they will need for college. Students will also explore the concepts of intrinsic and extrinsic motivation and tie these motivations into a possible vision of their future selves. Post-Secondary Plans and Readiness Rubrics will also be updated.

GRADE 9: Why does postsecondary success matter? Students will use a tool called The Personal Readiness Evaluation for Postsecondary to assess their own social emotional readiness regarding expectations and self-efficacy, effort, persistence, and self-regulated learning. In addition, SMART goals will be reviewed and set for the year, and students will review where they can find help when they need it. Freshmen will also be reviewing SMART goals and updating them for the school year. Both the Postsecondary Plan and Readiness Rubric will be updated for each student.

GRADE 10: Sophomores will learn an effective note-taking method called Cornell Notes and how to use them for studying individually and with groups. They will also be introduced to Design Thinking to creatively solve problems and practice how to manage their time successfully. Time management is another key topic that will be addressed. Sophomores will update their Readiness Rubrics and Post-Secondary Plans. Workshop: Considering Connections between Types Intellect and Future Careers GRADE 11: Juniors will be administered and reflect on the PREP (Personal Readiness Evaluation for Postsecondary) Survey. They will also focus on delaying gratification so that they will be ready to set and complete longer term goals before they will get their reward (education first, well-paying career to follow). Juniors will finish the month by studying what learning looks like at the college level. Students will update their Readiness Rubrics and Post-Secondary Plans. Workshop: Career Interests Survey GRADE 12: Seniors will be looking at their "to do lists" for fall winter and summer concerning postsecondary options. They will also be getting ready to complete postsecondary applications and figuring out how to keep their academic momentum going so they can avoid the dreaded "senior slump'. Financial aid options like grants, scholarships, loans, and work-study will be discussed as well. Seniors will update Post-Secondary Plans and Readiness Rubrics.
