Gretchen Lee has been named the 2022 Minnesota Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS) teacher of the year. Gretchen has taught FCS in Badger, ISD #676 for 16 years. She received her secondary education degree with a BA from Central Michigan University. Upon moving to Minnesota, she earned her BS degree for Family and Consumer Sciences from North Dakota State University.

In 2016, Gretchen received the Kramer Brown Teacher Recognition Award as an exemplary teacher educator. Her superintendent/principal shared that Gretchen’s diverse work and life experiences has enhanced the students learning at their school. Gretchen has strong connections with students, colleagues, and community members.

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Badger School's Ramp-Up Topics for November

GRADE 6: Sixth grade students will focus on setting goals while learning how to set **SMART** (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Timely) goals. Not only will students practice setting goals, they will learn the importance of using a planner for scheduling school and personal events.

GRADE 7: During November, seventh graders will be learning about the importance of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills and responsible decision-making. They will focus on peer interactions that can sometimes hamper student learning and learn strategies to create more positive ways to interact with others. Additionally, students will discuss skills they already use in school (like teamwork and resiliency) and how these skills are necessary for them to be successful in the workplace as well. Postsecondary Plans will be updated.

GRADE 8: Students will be discussing motivation. What things make you want to achieve a goal and are those things intrinsic (self-satisfaction or self-reward for a job well done) or extrinsic (a reward from someone else – praise, prize, etc.)? Students will identify what things motivate them as individuals and how they may help form their future selves. Eighth graders will also complete the Postsecondary Plan.

GRADE 9: Freshmen will be learning why postsecondary success matters and the purpose for engaging in Ramp-Up to Readiness™. Students will also learn how the Postsecondary Plan connects their career, postsecondary, and college plans, helps create postsecondary financial strategies, and provides information about students' strengths that will enable them to reach their career and postsecondary aspirations. Students will also complete the Personal Readiness Evaluation for Postsecondary (PREP) which helps them where they currently are with skills needed to be successful: expectations and self-efficacy, effort and persistence, and self-regulation. The importance of attendance and showing up to school every day is vital to school and their future selves.

GRADE 10: This unit has juniors assess how they currently spend their time and provides suggestions on how to best manage their time. This is a common problem for college students and practice in high school can help avoid problems later. Students will think about the concept of "filling their jar" so that important things get done first, address the concept of productivity, and explain what productive people do to accomplish tasks and stay motivated.

GRADE 11: Juniors will spend November learning about what college learning and the research process is like compared with what they currently experience as high school students.

GRADE 12: Seniors will be looking at their "to do lists" for fall, winter, and summer concerning postsecondary options. They will also be getting ready to complete postsecondary applications, learning about the FAFSA, and how to get the most from a college visit.

Payton Lee: Yes, because I think students like to listen to music to block out the sound of other students talking to each other. It is distracting to students who like to work in complete silence.


Morgan Hickey: You should have a choice because for some people it helps them focus, but for others it doesn't.

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Twice Baked Potatoes

Ingredients:

- 4 large russet potatoes (about 1 pound)
- Extra virgin olive oil
- ½ cup sour cream
- ½ cup milk
- 2 tablespoons butter, softened
- 1 tablespoon cream

Stuffing Option 1: Cheddar & Bacon

- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese
- 4 strips bacon
- ¼ cup chopped green onion

Stuffing Option 2: Blue Cheese & Chives

- 1 cup crumbled blue cheese
- ¼ cup chopped fresh chives
- ½ teaspoon salt




Directions:

- Bake the potatoes:** Preheat the oven to 400°F. Scrub the potatoes clean under running water. Poke each potato in several places with the tines of a fork so that when the potatoes are cooking they don't explode. Rub the potatoes all over with a little olive oil. Place directly on the middle or top rack of the oven. Cook for 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until the potatoes are cooked through. They should give a little when pressed.
- Cook the bacon if using:** While the potatoes are cooking, cook the bacon strips in a frying pan on medium low heat for 10 to 15 minutes, or until crisp. Drain on paper towels. Let cool. Crumble.
- Make potato "boats:"** Allow the potatoes to cool to touch. Slice the top third lengthwise off the potato. Use a spoon to scoop out the insides, forming a potato "canoe," leaving about ¼ inch of potato on the skin.
- Mash potato insides with sour cream, milk, butter:** Place the scooped out potato insides, sour cream, milk, cream, and butter into a large bowl. Mash with a potato masher. If you want a creamy texture, beat with an electric beater until desired consistency. Do not over beat the potatoes! They can turn gluey if you do.
- Stuff potato shells with filling:** Mix in the stuffing options with the potato filling. Reserve some of the stuffing options to sprinkle on the tops of the potatoes. Spoon filling into the potato shells. Sprinkle with extra toppings.
- Bake:** Reduce the oven temperature to 350 F. Place potatoes on a roasting pan or baking sheet and bake 15 to 20 minutes until heated through.






