Badger School's Ramp-Up to Readiness Program Enters Eighth Year

The Badger School is pleased to offer the Ramp-Up to Readiness program to our students again this year. As a reminder, Ramp-Up's curriculum focuses on preparing students for postsecondary education and life by targeting five specific areas (Readiness Pillars):

- 1. Academic Readiness: Students have the knowledge and skills to do first-year, college-level work.
- 2. Admissions Readiness: Students have completed requirements for admission for the postsecondary education that matches their goals, interests, and abilities.
- 3. Career Readiness: Students understand how education determines income and opportunity in the global economy, which types of jobs need skilled workers, will pay enough to support a family, and will be a good match for their interests and abilities.
- 4. *Financial Readiness*: Students will be able to cover the cost of one term of study at a postsecondary institution through savings, loans, work-study, and/or financial aid.
- 5. Social & Emotional Readiness: Students know how to set educational goals, make progress toward those goals, and build relationships with peers and adults that support the achievement of those goals.

Badger students in grades 6-12 meet weekly with their grade level advisors to complete activities that will help prepare them in the five areas above. In addition, students will create a Readiness Rubric that allows them to continually monitor their progress toward reaching their academic goals. Students also create a Postsecondary Plan to help them plan their academic and career life beyond high school. Students meet with their advisors in a workshop setting that could involve guest speakers, interest inventories, career surveys and exploration, filling out college applications, and more.

Here is a snapshot of the topics students will study in October:

GRADE 6: Students will focus on the importance of college readiness and the main components of the Ramp-Up program, how to calculate GPA, and why it is important for them to do well in their classes. Sixth graders will also work on the PREP (Personal Readiness for Postsecondary) Survey.

Workshop: Career Cluster Interest Survey

GRADE 7: Seventh grade students will learn how important having good habits like being organized, taking effective notes, showing up ready to learn each and every day, studying, and setting goals will help them be more successful academically. Study groups and learning about their individual learning styles will also be addressed. Students will learn more about SMART goals, the importance of self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making. Post-Secondary Plans will be updated.

GRADE 8: Students will review the habits they have that make them successful and how to set goals to help them be even more successful. Using a planner, taking Cornell Notes, and setting SMART goals are important to helping students succeed in school. Eighth graders will also investigate what motivates them intrinsically and extrinsically, as well as what academic knowledge they will need for college. Students will also be preparing questions for a career panel. Post-Secondary Plans will also be updated. **Workshop: Career Panel**

GRADE 9: Freshmen will be looking at the standards required by the State of Minnesota and the Badger School in order to earn a high school diploma, and what courses and requirements they would need to complete before being accepted into a four-year university like the U of M. Students will also be addressing the concept of a global economy and preparing questions for a panel of community members who will discuss their careers and the education/training it takes to achieve those careers. Freshmen will updated their Postsecondary Plans.

Workshop: Career Panel

GRADE 10: Sophomores will learn an effective note-taking method called Cornell Notes and how to use them for studying individually and with groups. They will also be introduced to Design Thinking to creatively solve problems and practice how to manage their time successfully. Time management is another key topic that will be addressed. Sophomores will update their Post-Secondary Plans.

Workshop: Considering Connections between Types Intellect and Future Careers

GRADE 11: Juniors will be administered and reflect on the PREP (Personal Readiness Evaluation for Postsecondary) Survey. They will also focus on delaying gratification so that they will be ready to set and complete longer term goals before they will get their reward (education first, well-paying career to follow). Juniors will finish the month by studying what learning looks like at the college level. Students will update their Post-Secondary Plans.

Workshop: Career Interests Survey

GRADE 12: Seniors will be looking at their "to do lists" for fall, winter, and summer, concerning postsecondary options. They will also be getting ready to complete postsecondary applications, learning about the FAFSA, and learning how to get the most from a college visit. Seniors will update their Post-Secondary Plan.

BUILDING READERS

How Families Can Help Children Become Better Readers

Be your child's reading buddy to boost fluency and comprehension

Some children struggle to sound out every word as they read. This can actually make it hard to understand what they are

reading. Helping your child read more accurately and fluently can make reading easier and more fun for him.

To be a reading fluency buddy:

- 1. Look for a short passage that your child would find interesting. Make sure it is at his reading level, too.
- **2. Read the passage aloud** while he listens and follows along.
- **3. Have him read** the passage aloud. If he has trouble reading it, read it to him again. Then have your child read it after you.
- 4. Ask each other questions about

what you read. What was the biggest challenge characters faced? Discuss your favorite characters or the most entertaining part. This will help build your child's comprehension skills.



It is important to be on the same page as your child's teacher when it comes to reading. Work together to set appropriate goals for your child. Talk to the teacher about your child's:

- **Reading level.** Is your child meeting expectations for her grade? What kinds of materials are best for her? How can you tell if a book is the right level? How can you help her improve her literacy skills?
- **Reading habits.** Many teachers expect students to read for a certain number of minutes each day. Should your child keep and turn in a log to track the time she spends reading? What other ideas does the teacher have to motivate your child and instill good reading habits?

Decoding strategies help your child figure out words

When readers hit a word they don't know, they need to decode it. Decoding skills include sounding out words.

Have your child try these strategies:

- Notice familiar beginnings and endings.
- Say parts of a word slowly and then blend them together.
- Try different sounds for the same letters.
- Look for smaller, familiar words within the difficult word.

Ask your child to tell you a story for a change

Next time your child asks you to tell him a story, trade places. Let him make up a story of his own, and when he finishes, suggest he write it down. Encourage him to leave spaces so he can add illustrations. Now he'll be the author of a tale he can read whenever he likes.

Explore nonfiction with your child

To achieve in school, your child will have to be able to learn. Reading nonfiction books on topics she likes is a great way to practice.

Reading nonfiction helps your child:

- Apply comprehension skills to factual content.
- Develop new hobbies or interests.
- Learn how authors use text to inform and persuade their readers.

Help your elementary schooler persevere through reading challenges

Reading is part of many home and school activities, so if your child struggles with it, it can feel as if it affects every part of his life—and his confidence can suffer.

To support your child:

- **Consult his teacher.** Ask about realistic expectations. What has your child's teacher noticed? What strategies have been taught and how can you apply them at home? What additional help is available?
- Use reading materials at home that minimize frustration. Choose books that are easy for your child to read and understand. This builds his confidence while he is reading.
- **Stay positive about his learning.** Focus on how his strengths can help. Remember to to notice progress and praise your child for his effort.

Now that it's October, pumpkins are everywhere! Make a pumpkin the center of your family reading with books like *The Biggest Pumpkin Ever* by Steven Kroll or *It's Pumpkin Time* by Zoe Hall.

Then, play some pumpkinrelated word games! Have fun as a family while you build language skills. Here's how:

- Look at a pumpkin. Who can make the longest list of words or phrases that describe it? (round, lumpy, orange, future pie, etc.)
- Write the word pumpkin on a large sheet of paper. How many smaller words can each person make from the letters in it? (pump, pin, pink, etc.)

Put family reading on the schedule during times when everyone is home—even if it's just once a week. Perhaps you could schedule a reading dinner or a surprise DEAR (Drop Everything and Read)

time during Saturday chores. The key is to make reading a fun part of already established family routines.

Mnemonic devices work!

A mnemonic ("neh-mon-ic") device is a tool used to remember information. Mnemonics can help your child with tricky spelling words. She could make up a sentence like Big Elephants Could Always Use Some Exercise to help her remember how to spell the word because.

- *Grandma Chickenlegs* by Geraldine McCaughrean. When Tatia's stepmother sends her to get a needle from Grandma Chickenlegs, the evil woman traps the girl in her cottage.

2 cups white chocolate chips, melted

½ cup semisweet chocolate chips, melted

Directions:

- Use a food processor to crush cookies into fine crumbs.
- Add all but 2 tablespoons crushed cookies to a medium bowl. Add cream cheese and vanilla and stir until evenly combined.
- Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Using a small cookie scoop, form mixture into small balls. Place on prepared baking sheet and freeze until slightly hardened, about 30 minutes.
- Dip the frozen balls in melted white chocolate until coated and baking sheet. Drizzle with semisweet chocolate. Freeze until chocolate hardens, about 15 minutes.
